

The object of the League is the advancement of Amateur Radio within the Province of Manitoba, Canada, by such means as may be appropriate, including the holding of conferences, exhibitions, hamfests, contests and the making of representations on behalf of the League and its members to government, or other authorities, groups or individuals.

Dear Fellow VE4's:

The provocative letter by Tom, VE4SE, which has been reprinted to apprise Manitoba Amateurs of our declining membership, and the Minutes of the ARLM Board of Directors Meeting, should bring to your attention the unfortunate position we find ourselves in because of an apparent lack of interest in this provincial organization.

This copy of the MANAM is being circulated to all Manitoba Amateurs to acquaint them with the situation, and to pose them the question; Do we want a provincial organization, or not? If interest in the organization is to be measured by membership in ARLM, then the answer is NO! With the present membership well under 200, the fixed costs of producing, printing and mailing the MANAM at the present rate will leave us with a substantial annual deficit. Work it out for yourself. The present revenue at \$4.00 membership subscription for 170 members amounts to \$680.00. The cost of sending out our regular five issues in 1981 is approximately \$900.00 (\$720.00 has been spent on four issues so far, including postage) In addition, a Callbook would cost approximately \$275.00, NOT including postage. With the cost of postage going up considerably, there are only two options available to us if we wish to continue under these terms; either increase the annual subscription by a considerable amount; or get sufficient members to be able to cover the costs.

We must also bear in mind that the previous Callbooks were produced at minimal cost through the goodwill and generosity of ex VE4AI, Steve, We can, of course, print a Callbook in place of one of the regular MANAM issues early in 1982. This is under consideration by the Board of Directors. Thus, we realize, that the Callbook is a popular item to ARLM members, but its cost requires a compromise unless ARLM membership increases in the next few weeks.

Along with renewed interest in membership, a healthy organization of this kind requires sufficient responsible representation on its Board of Directors to function in the best interest of the members. Right now a little more interest is being shown; Don, VE4ACA, of Brandon, and Jim, VE4AGS, of Clearwater, have been nominated and appointed as Directors until formal elections are held. We still need a nomination for a Northern Director and, following the recent resignation of VE4QL as Treasurer, a replacement for that position. Additionally, because of my own situation, I am forced to step down as President as quickly as a replacement can be appointed; prior to the New Year if possible

In addition to new directors, we need people who are <u>willing</u> to <u>organize</u> and <u>help</u> in setting up events by ARLM. I can only remember, with disappointment, that both the CARF Symposium and the November Auction were left to Len. 4QL, and a handful of Winnipeg Amateurs to organize. In spite of several previous appeals, nobody had volunteered to help. Infact without Len. 4QL, John, 4OL, and Tom, 4SE, the auction would have been a failure.

Well there it is fellow VE4's, certainly not good news, but if we are prepared to act, it is by no means bad news. We do have a small financial nest-egg. We can continue to operate the way we are going and soon that reserve will be no more. OR, we can act immediately to collectively support this organization and maintain a provincial voice for the Manitoba Amateurs. It is entirely up to you - ALL

The following article on the Dauphin Ukranian Festival which was held this Summer has been sent in by Joe, VEAAFM.

Visitors to Canada's National Ukranian Festival this year were afforded an opportunity to witness Amateur Radio in action. The recently mevived Dauphin Amateur Radio Club put their thinking caps on and decided to approach the Festival committee for permission to have a booth promoting amateur radio. The committee heartilly endorsed the project and John, VELADX and Chris, VELANE spearheaded the drive to bring it to fru-Ltion.

Working like beavers they chomped down trees to provide masts and plastered together the lodge (radio shack) so that on opening day, July Oth, ably assisted by VE4AJE, VE4ADP, VE4IN, VE4VL, VE6CT, and S.W.L. Avril all was in readiness for operation. The station consisted of a Kenwood TS-820 with a Drake MN-4 matching network to dipole antennas on 75 and 20 meters. 2M traffic was handled with a Yaesu CPU-2500 using a 5/8 mobile whip working into the Baldy Mtn. Repeater. The station operated under the call sign of VE4NE/Portable and the main operators were: VE4NE, VE4ADX, VE4IN, VE4YE, VE4ABE and VE6CT with able assistance from two visiting

American Hams, K8EQN and KD6JV. Great interest was displayed by the many visitors from all over Canada and many of the States. As well as providing information, handing cut literature and demonstrating the versatility of amateur radio the operators encouraged visitors to provide messages for relay to relatives back home. One of the hardest jobs the opprators had was to convince visitors that the messages were being transmitted as a public service at no charge. As one lady remarked "If it's not going to cost me anything then you must be going to charge me at the other end." The station operated 36 hours and 103 radiograms were handled all being cleared by August 4, 1981. Visiting hams were K8EQN, KD6JV, WA6EQA, W7LOL, VE6CT, VE6AYX, VE5KU, VE5ER, VE5UV, VE3CAS, VE4ACT, VE4AGR, VE4SE, VE4YE and S.W.L., Pete from Roblin. All in all a very successful project with plans to make it bigger and better next year, more advance publicity, possibly a special call sign and commercative QSL card.

Our thanks to all who helped, to the National Ukranian Festival Committee who gave us this opportunity to present "ham radio" to the thousands of people who attended the festival, to C.A.R.F. who provided us with the leterature for handouts and my personal apologies to anyone I have failed to mention in this report.

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Here are some short takes from the C.R.R.L. Bulletin which is of interest to Manitoba Amateurs.

Gil Frederick, VE4AG, has started a Canadian slow-scan television

net. It meets every Sunday, at 2100Z, on 14.185 MHz.

How much is an "S" unit? The following was recommended: 1. an "S"

unit should represent 6 db of change, 2. below 30 MHz, S-9 should equal
50 microvolts of signal across a 50 ohm load, 3. above 30 MHz, S-9 should
equal 5 microvolts of signal across a 50 ohm load.

If high SWR on your feedline causes your 2M rig to reduce power, try

a matching stub. Where the coax enters the plug on the back of your rig, parallel another length of coax, about 1 meter long. Clip the coax, an inch at a time, until the RF output meter reads full power. Certain conditions may require shorting the end of the stub as you clip.

The following are the minutes of the annual A.R.L.M. Board of Director Meeting, which was held in Neepawa, Sunday October 11, 1981.

Present at the meeting were: Noel Funge, VE4CF-President and Eastern Director, Len Herrington, VE4QL-Secretary/Treasurer, Ton Mills, VE4SE-Eastern Director, Dale Johnson, VE4AED-Eastern Director, Harold Fehr, VELAAF-Eastern Director, Joe Thordarson, VELADJ-Editor, MANAM, Don Bettof, VELACA-Nominee, Western Director, Malcolm Timlick, VELAM: Observer, Mac English, VEATE-Coserver.

The meeting opened at 13.00 hours, and in his introductory address the President, Noel, VE4CF, stressed the point that the A.R.L.M. administration was not working effectively, and that the Constitution must be reviewed to correct the situation. The revised Constitution must then be submitted to the Government Corporate Branch for approval.

A disturbing trend is the loss of members, and action must be taken

to correct this.

A review of the foundation of the A.R.L.M. and its relationship to W.A.R.A./W.A.R.C. from 1967/68 was presented.

The Constitution:

In discussion on the administration and the constitution, Tom, VE4SE, referred to his letter in the MANAM and questioned the value of A.R.L.M. to the Amateurs of Manitoba. A good interchange of opinions was expressed or what members expect of A.R.L.M., and what the organization should, and could, offer. It was clear that those present did not have the answers, and that it will be necessary to investigate this area further, by a questionnaire, or implimentation of individual suggestions.

Len, VE4QL, suggested that a committee be formed to review the Constitution. A report to be submitted to the Directors by 31 March 1982.

Membership

Considerable time was spent in discussion of ways and means of improving our membership. It was generally agreed that the Call-Book is a selling point, but the costs are now becoming prohibitive with a small membership. The \underline{MANAM} is essential, but also a financial liability unless we have a good membership, and/or an increase in dues.

Harold, VELAAF, suggested combining the Call-Book and the MANAM in one issue, but the number of pages, and postal weight involved make this un-

economical.

In a majority vote, it was agreed that the next issue of the MANAM includes a sample cover and one page of the Call-Book as a promotion and that it be mailed to all Amateurs in Manitoba.

In his opposition to the vote, Tom, VELSE, felt that a more drastic approach should be taken, and that a Call-Book - framed in black - be mailed as the last issue.

Publications

Len, VEAQL, submitted the cost of the MANAM for 1981, to date, as \$720.00 and the publication of a Call-Book as \$275.00 (not including postage). It should be noted that when Steve, VE7KZ (ex-VE4AI) originated and produced the Call-Book, costs were minimal. Oce, VE4ADJ and Noel, VE4CF will get competitive prices on the cost of

producing the Call-Book, and the former is prepared to amend, and prepare

the masters.

Production will be subject to an increase in membership. The target date being Spring, 1982. As noted on the front cover of the Call-Book 300 (membership) is considered economical.

Len, VELQL, as Treasurer, submitted a breakdown of income and expenditures for 1981, to date. As noted above, the MANAM has already cost \$720. The symposium had a loss of only \$8.00 thanks to a donation of \$66.00 from

Income is seriously down due to falling membership (166 at last count)

but a small profit is anticipated from the up-coming auction, which also, usually, results in a notable renewal of membership. A further interest payment on bank reserves is due. A deficit budget was planned for 1981 and the year presently stands at \$500.00 approximately in the red.

Following a discussion, it was agreed that an A.R.L.M. net be instituted for the first Monday of each month, to follow the Manitcha net.

Tom, VE4SE, explained the policy of licence plates. The next issue will be 1983, and a problem to be overcome is the control of plates where radic licences have not been renewed, and/or, have been re-issued. Individual notification, by mail, has become expensive. Suggestions were offered, and will be considered. Tom, VEASE, made particular reference offered, and will be considered. Tom, VE4SE, made particular reference to where the widow of an Amateur must, but does not, return the plates yet continues to use the vehicle.

A complete printing of plates only causes embarasment when Amateurs do not purchase, and thereby leave a quantity surplus.

Noel, VE4CF, drew attention to vacancies on the Board of Directors.

Don, VE4ACA, had been invited to accept a position as Western Director, this he agreed to. Malcolm, VE4MG, declined.

Jim Prentice, VE4JI, is no longer a paid-up member, and therefore his

position as Northern Director has become vacant.

Noel, VE4CF, advised the meeting that he wished to resign from the President's position, but will remain as a Director. He requested the

other Directors to appoint a new President before year end.

Len, VE4QL, stated that the Secretary position is vacant, as he has been acting Secretary since Rolly, VE5RS (ex-VE4RS) left for Saskatchewan. The Treasurer's position is also, technically, vacant as, inadvertently, when he resigned as a Director, it was overlooked that the Constitution states that the Treasurer must be a Director.

These points will be subject to action by the Directors, and it was emphasized that the policy was for the President to have a Secretary appointed in his area. This will allow better co-ordination of business

Noel, VEAJF, thanked all for attending, and in particular thanked Mac, VEAJE for arranging the excellent accommodation in the City Council Champers.

The meeting was adjourned at 16.45 hours.

The following bit of historical information should be of some interest to many Amateurs like Malcolm, VEAQST. I found this information in THE GROUNDWAVE.

RADIO TUBES MAY BE OBSOLETE, NEW METAL MEEDS NO WARMUP.

A new kind of radio set (Globe and Mail, July, 1948) which allows music to begin instantly when the set is turned on, was shown by Bell Telephone Laboratories. This set has no vacuum tubes. Nothing lights, nothing even glows and nothing gets warm. The set always is ready instantly because the usual tubes that have to warm up do not exist.

This invention, which replaces tubes, is a tiny cylinder of metal. Although this scylinder acts like a radio tube, there is no vacuum, no grid, no plate and no glass to keep air away. The new tube consists of two hair thin wires that run down to the base of an empty tube and stand on a bit of metal not much larger than the head of a pin. This piece of metal is the secret. The metal amplifies the current that one wire carries to it, and the other wire carries away the amplified current. The power it uses is less than that of an ordinary flashlight battery. The new tube is called a transistor and it is not on the market yet. The inventors are: Dr's John Bardeen and Walter Brattain.

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I found this little gem of information especially for all you students of Amateur Radio who have high hopes of writing your DOC examinations. The source of this knowledge is THE HAMILTON AMATEUR. It was written by Anonymous.

An open letter to Manhams

The following is a reprint of an article by Tom Mills, VE4SE which was first published in the last issue of the MANAM. Tom invites comments from all Manitoba Hams. Please send any comments into me; Joe, VE4ADJ Editor of the MANAM.

With all the local clubs now in existence throughout the province, do we really need A.R.L.M.? At one time with the few hams outside of Winnipeg and scattered about the province we had a need to try and keep them informed as to what was happening. Now I believe this has changed. It is also very hard to get directors. No one wants to become involved. If you don't believe that's true, look at the directors now involved and see how many times they have been elected by acclamation. It's nice to think there is nobody better to do my job so that's why I am always re-elected. It's a great boost to my ego. Or, is it no one else wants the job? It's such a lousy position let him keep it. The above statements do not pertain to my position only but to all positions on the club. Of the 800+ Amateurs in Manitoba we have 166 paid members.

Len Herrington, VEAQL has received a letter asking why there has been no current Call Book for Manitoba issued this year by the A.R.L.M. The first page of the current Call Book gives the answer. I quote "In order to insure that this service continues we need a minimum of 300 members" unquote. Also, who wants to take on the job of publishing it? We have 166 members. Our financial picture is good at present. Should we dip into the funds for the Call Book until all the money is gone? Then what? If the A.R.L.M. did fold, then what? What should

we do with the money left over? I have several suggestions.

Donate to the Winnipeg Repeater Society. I believe they are servicing more hams in the province than anyone else. Donate it evenly to all the repeater groups in the province. That way many more hams would benefit. Divide the money between all the recognized clubs in Manitoba. Have a party for all paid up members as of this date. (I like this last one) License plates, no problem there I would continue as long as necessary, or perhaps someone else preferably in Winnipeg, could take it over. Or, W.A.R.C. might want to look after it. As you don't have to be a member of a club to receive plates, I don't believe you have to be a member of a club to administer it.

Auction. Is two auctions a year too many? If there was no A.R.L.M. to put on an auction maybe W.A.R.C. would look after a spring and fall

event, or maybe one auction would be enough.

The above letter is my own personal view. It in no way is a reflection of statements or policy from the other directors. In fact, I have not even discussed the above with any other director.

Do we have rebuttals? Let's hear them. Tear my letter apart if

you can, let's hear any other suggestions.

If there is anybody now, who does not have a VE4 plate and would like one in 1983, please send me a letter to that effect. What I require is a letter stating you are the present holder of the call sign and you are requesting a VEA plate. Sign the letter along with your name, address and call sign and mail it to me. Your name will be added to the list and sent to the Motor Vehicle Branch. Please do this early. The list will probably be called for early in the new year.

At present I cannot tell you the cost. During the past six years there was a \$6.00 fee for the special plate. This was payable only once during the duration of the plate issue.

The plates can only be gotten from the Motor Vehicle Branch in Winnipeg. They either be mailed in for or picked up personally. They are not sent to AutoPac agents.

The regulations for the VE4 plates are:

You must be the owner of the call.

You must be the registered owner of the motor vehicle.

Company or leased cars cannot have VEA plates.

Trucks and Motorcycles cannot have VE4 plates as they start with a different prefix.

The extra fee is payable to the Motor Vehicle Branch when you receive your plates.

For any further information please contact me. Ion't call the

Motor Vehicle Branch as they will only refer you to me.

Remember, if you do not have plates now and want them in 1983 send me a letter early. If I don't get your name on the list you will not receive a VE4 plate in 1983. I have no idea when the cut-off date is so mail in NOW.

end fed. "J" antenna.

The following article entitled; "CARF news with a Manitoba Bend", was sent in by Malcolm, VE4MG. These items were rewritten from the CARF News Service.

CARF News Service Bulletins have been cut in half because the volunteers who put them out are finding demands from work and school allow only every second week to get out a bulletin.

One of the recommendations of the CARF National Amateur Symposium held in Winnipeg last May has been accepted by DOC. The DOC has authorized ten-meter repeater operation on frequencies above 29.5 MHz. It will be interesting to see how quickly the Winnipeg Repeater Society reacts on this one.

If you hear a VEO on the air, this prefix will be restricted to use by Canadian vessels who normally operate outside of Canadian waters. Those who operate on board a vessel normally in Canadian waters will use their home call plus maritime mobile. The policy is effective immediately for new applicants and will be in full effect by April 1, 1982.

Amateurs in Ottawa and Vancouver have started satellite packet radio transmissions between themselves using Amik-B with special permission from DOC. VE3FLL is hooked to the Communications Reserch Center's ground station through a local 220 packet repeater to a 220 MHz station at the Center's space facility with a similar hook-up at VE7PU's end. Montreal packet enthusiasts will be hooked into the network by a 220 MHz link with the Ottawa packet system. Manitoba lacks a 220 packet repeater or access to a ground station. Do we even have any packet operators?

Although we may not be rushing to take up packet radion in Manitoba judging by "reading the mail", it appears there is some interest in the new 10, 18 and 24 MHz band. KK2XJM is now broadcasting beacon signals

on these bands from Florida with special permission of the FCC.

Experiments are also being considered in the U.S. using spread spectrum operation in the 50 - 54 MHz, 2 meter band and 220 MHz and above. One problem is that the FCC can't monitor the transmissions as they are too sophisticated and in effect are encoded. The commission would rely on self-policing by those Amateurs who can afford the necessarily expensive and sophisticated gear required. Little comment from the rand and file in Manitoba has been heard on the subject of spread spectrum. It is likely that most of us do not really know what it is. With the SSB discovery a few years ago what will be the impact of spread spectrum on the

average ham? At this point it is difficult to say.

BOC has decided to continue special prefixes. We in Manitoba have seen a number of these - VA for the Winnipeg Centennial, KJ4 for the Olympic Games, etc. If you are interested in getting a special prefix sometime in the future, here are the categories as laid out by BOC. In the first category, the event must be of national significance and if granted the prefix would be good for two months. In the second category, which would be valid for one month, the happening mut be related to a significant provincial or territorial occasion or an anniversary. Such an event would be deemed 'significant' if a government proclamation inaugurated it. The third area for special prefixes, which would run for two weeks, is where an official municipal historical or cultural event is taking place. Valid anniversaries which may be eligible for special prefixes are the fiftieth, sixtieth, seventy-fifth year or one-hundredth and twenty-fifth year thereafter. Got anything in mind?

CW Bulletins are sent at 18 wpm; RTTY Bulletins are sent at 60 wpm with 170 Hz shift, then repeated on 110-baud ASCII.

On Fridays UTC, a DX Bulletin replaces the regular bulletin transmission. In Manitoba, listen for Malcolm, VE4MG (VE4QST) at five minutes to 7 pm for voice bulletins on 3.765 MHZ plus or minus QRM, just prior to the Manitoba Evening Phone Net. Also in Winnipeg area listen to VE4MAN (146.01 - .61 Mhz) as Jimmy, VE4VJ replays taped bulletins of

interest to local Amateurs, throughout the day.
